2024 was definitely a year for the books! I think we had more rides canceled this past year for weather than in any of the last 5 years I've been part of this chapter! It is amazing that even with all the miles we lost due to excessive heat in July and August, the canceled rides due to rain throughout the year, and other issues, we still managed to ride more miles as a chapter than in 2023. Some of this was due to having a couple of long, overnight rides, like the one to Sturgis, but we did ride over 15141 miles on chapter rides. This was over 5000 miles more than last year! Our end-of-the-year winners were Fred Honeycutt with 7902 miles, Jim Stone with 7171, and Rick Leighton with 7032 miles. Our local-only mileage winners were Ted Lawson with 3515 miles, Rick Leighton with 3362 miles, and Fred Honeycutt with 3084. Our top passengers were Sandy Honeycutt with 6658 total miles and 1840 local miles, Vicki Melle with 1722 and 867, and Sheila Hyatt with 887 and 452 respectively.

2025 has already kicked off with our New Year's Day ride. If you haven't signed up for the new Ride 365 program with Southside, you can see Leslie upstairs at the dealership or a Road Captain during the month of January. We want to get everyone enrolled for the new year. If you don't have your Chapter Mileage Program number to participate in that program, see me to get one! I hope you've enjoyed your holiday season and are ready to ride!

Remember, the Chapter Mileage Program is different from the Ride 365 program and in addition to that program through Harley-Davidson. To sign up for your Ride 365 mileage program, you can see one of our Road Captains on any ride in January. They will have a signup sheet similar to what you can give Leslie at the Dealership. To sign up, you'll need your HOG number, last 6 of your VIN and your mileage to start the year. This should be easy since you'll have your bike there with you when you come to a ride! Your 365 miles may also earn you awards and gift cards from Harley. So, sign up at the start of the year!



ALL Year Long-

The other day, I posted a meme that said "Always keep a look out, some of us ride all year long. Well, I am some of us! If it's over 25 degrees, I will ride. Not in the snow, and I avoid heavy wind but, cold doesn't bother me. The reason I am writing this, though, isn't due to the weather, it's about the need to tell people to watch out for Bikers ANYTIME.

We are licensed vehicles that share the road every day with others. The total lack of regard for safety while driving is absurd. I pay attention to all drivers, even when I am driving in the cage. I see people on the phone, eating, putting on make up, reading (yes reading), texting..... It's downright scary. The fact that people are in a 2000 pound killing machine doesn't seem to be a thought. Most motorcycle accidents are Not the fault of the biker but, someone just Not paying attention. We do things to make us safer. Loud pipes, train air horns, reflective clothing and gear, extra lighting. None of it seems to make a difference. I honestly believe that there should be at least one question about spotting a motorcycle on the driver's test.

So, what can we do about it? If I see someone doing something that will put me in danger, I get their attention and have them put the phone down or stop doing what ever it is. Most of the time, I get a shocked look, but they comply.

This brings me to the next issue. That's the people that don't think motorcycles are vehicles that have a right to share the road with them. Unfortunately, some of these people go out of their way to move us off the road. I have encountered this a couple of times but, I will not put in writing how I resolved those issues.

Both of these things need attention. Police enforcement would be nice, but education is the best thing we can do. Constantly remind your friends that don't ride to keep an eye out for motorcycles, explain the plight we go through. When they say how dangerous it is, explain that it wouldn't be if everyone paid attention. If they hear it enough, they will say it too. Play games like counting bikes, while driving. It helps to train your eyes to look for them. Post, on social media, as often as possible, that we are out there and for everyone to watch out for us. Make sure we are represented in a positive manner. Yes, there are some bad elements to the biker community, The speed junkies, the wheelie riders, the "gang" element but, that is not the vast majority of us, and we need to point that out. And above all, Pay Attention yourself. Expect the other person not to see you or not care about you. The more you do that, the more you can avoid a very bad situation.

Stay safe while you are riding, dress for the weather, wear layers that you can take off or put on as needed. Check your tire pressure. Do the maintenance on your bike often and enjoy the ride!

6 IT'S HERE!

Didn't sleep much, walked the floor and felt a fair amount of anxiety. I had waited for the conversion of Shaman for 6 weeks. I traveled to the shop in Richmond, which was doing the work, a couple of times, and I worried. A lot. I felt like that time 65 or so years ago when I awaited the arrival of my first born! Would it look good? Would it ride good? Would I have problems riding it? The night before I was supposed to pick it up I was hollowed eyed!

In truth, I was not all that excited about getting a trike. And I really did not want to lose the 135 CU engine I had had installe4 nor my functioning CB. But our esteemed Parts Guru at Southside, Joe, showed me a picture of the California Sidecar Co. conversion, told me about it and in the end, sort of cost me a bunch of money!

California Sidecar, as the name suggests, originated as a Company building sidecars 30+ years ago in Southern California. They soon began building trikes for Brand X motorcycles and then moved to the western part of Virginia, to the small town of Arrington. (Near Lynchburg) They then expanded to building trike kits for all motorcycles, to order.

I spoke to Dwight, the founder, owner and still President of CSC a few times at some length about converting my '23 Anniversary CVO and he finally decided that, while he could build the trike kit for my bike, he did not have the capability of matching the CVO paint but had a dealer in Richmond, Virginia who did have a painter with that kind of equipment and skill, Richmond Superbike, located near the Richmond Airport. I contacted the owner of that shop, Joey and then together with my friend Steve Clark, rode over there to talk with him. Joey booted up his computer program and together we specified every detail of my conversion and I ordered it, about Sept. 1.

My last two wheel ride, taking my Shaman to the dealer in Richmond was on November 16 having been advised that the kit had arrive4. I had the pleasure and honor of having a dozen HOG riders escort me there, one of whom was son Billy Jr.

The kit arrived in Richmond in late November and went immediately into the paint shop. The painter, using spectrograph (and skill) matched and painted it with 5 coats, then sent back it to Joey where it was installed and I was invited to come and pick up about 350 pounds of parts no longer needed on Shaman. (Available parts listed later.)

Finally, December 21, was the day to "come and get it".

I was given lots of advice about riding trikes, most notable of which was from Bill Arnold who told me it would be "different". Man, was he right! Different was hardly an adequate descriptor. I was taken next door to a large, empty parking lot by Joey and schooled on riding it. The ride was only a half day so I thought it would be a good ride for me to get acquainted with the Trike. And how! We rode on the little bitty, bumpy roads in Pungo known only to God, and by special dispensation, our Director, Linda Knowles. By the time we reached the Border Station, I needed a double wrap of Lanacane on my arms! So now, I'm working on that problem now!


